With the two phases out of the total seven of the ongoing Lok Sabha elections concluding - the first phase occurring on April 19 and the second phase on April 26the country is heading into the third phase, scheduled for May 7th, 2024. While the results are slotted to be announced on the 4th of June, the psephologists are buzzing with predictions. One of the prime points of debate remains voter turnout. Based on the current status of the election, the BJP is expected to eventually have a successful turnout. Reports suggest that Prime Minister Modi is set to return to power with an even larger mandate. The party has left no stone unturned - from bringing allies to the fold through mergers and annexations of the opposition's MPs to ensuring that it woos the younger generation on social media. Of the 200 seats where the Congress and its I.N.D.I.A alliance is in contest with the BJP, it will be a fight to the finish especially in Bengal and Maharashtra, with the former promising as much blood as it does violence.

The voting in the world's largest democracy this season comes with its own string of headlines. The Congress manifesto drew scathing remarks from the BJP which called it a to-do-list of the Muslim League with its hints at reservations on the basis of religion. Rahul Gandhi's pitch to conduct a financial survey across the country to promote financial equity led to multiple debates but it was Sam Petroda, a close advisor to Rahul Gandhi and President of the Congress's international wing, who hit the hornet's nest when he pointed out that the USA's inheritance law was an interesting concept that could be looked into for India. Under the law, 55% of a person's inheritance was taken away by the government permitting the individual to inherit only 45% of all property and monies. This brought forth from the Prime Minister the jibe that the Congress planned to loot the people 'Zindagi ke saath bhi, Zindagi ke baad bhi'.

For its share, the BJP and the Prime Minister seem to draw much attention from the western media with the Washington Post publishing an article on the possible hand of the government in a plot to kill the Khalistani leader Gurpatwant Singh Pannu. While much of the article came from unauthenticated sources it did reveal yet again the tendency of the western media to want to promote a certain narrative for India. The Opposition drew blood when the raging scandal involving nearly '3000 videos' of women being physically abused purportedly shot by the Karnataka JDS leader 33-yearold Prajwal Revanna, grandson of the stalwart leader Deve Gowda, surfaced. This will most certainly leave an impact in the poll-bound state. As the nation moves onto the third phase of the Lok Sabha Elections 2024 amid the rising summer heat, it marks the ordinary Indian to be a discerning voter. From rising prices of fuel to everyday goods to the question of internal and external security to preserving the mutli-culturalism of this vast country, the Indian voter has much to weigh before they make their choice. June will bring forth a defining answer which will chart the next decade of India's future. It is left to be seen whether it lives up to the expectations of its aspiring people living in an aspirational country in a swiftly changing world.

**ONE FOR THE** Racquet A icionados

n the 18th of April, 1915, a Morane-Saulnier Type L fighter bird with a punctured gas pipe and a German bullet, left a Doppler sight that seemed to hold across the Belgian sky. The inconvenienced Pilot was a celebrity of sorts at the L'Aviation Militaire and was, almost immediately after the crash landing, gained by his German Counterparts trying to carbonize his beloved aircraft and with it an avant-garde piece of war technology.

On the day the Great War began this 26 year old French aviator had found himself in the awkward position of being stranded in Berlin. In the years leading up to the war, he had set the world record for reaching the highest altitude by man in an airplane. He had become the first man to cross the Mediterranean sea in a plane and had performed numerous exhibition flights that had taken him all over the European continent.

In 1914, when the German troops were pouring into Belgium, the Aviator sat anxiously under house arrest in his Berlin hotel room, faced with the prospect of internment this man escaped through the bathroom window in the middle of the night to walk to the fields where his airplane sat. With a couple of gasoline cans on board he took off into the darkness to launch an exhilarating gradual ascent in the general direction of purpose and freedom.

These were the days when pilots would carry a handgun with them and shoot at enemy planes awkwardly jutting out midair as the heavy gust of wind crashed against their flapping leather helmets and dusty eyeglasses. This may seem comic to most by today's standards. By the end of 1914, our aviator who had been serving in the French Air Service, became part of a path breaking solution when he returned to test a recently developed device that enabled a pilot to fire bullets from a mounted machine-gun through the blades of the propeller of his plane. The device, employed successfully by this pilot in the early spring of 1915, allowed him to approach his enemies head-on in the air, giving him a vast advantage. On April fool's day in 1915, he nailed his first German victim, an Albatross reconnaissance aircraft, in the next two weeks, he downed four more. The American media dubbed him as the first flying ace of the War.

On the 18th of April, 1915, he was captured by the Germans at Hulste in Belgium. He escaped for the second time and made his way back into France. A German aircraft designer who went by the name of Anton Fokker advanced the technology gained from the wreckage of the French plane. He invented the Interrupter Gear, a far more elegant solution than the French Deflector Blades. This was eventually bettered in 1916 by none other than Marcel Dassault, who introduced the Éclair propeller for the Caudron G3. The French were aviation pioneers in the first half of the 20th Century, which through its great orderly tanglement of schemes, it still is well into the 21st century.

This French aviator's name was Roland Garros.

The Iran-Israel conflict serves as a reminder that countries do not just stumble into war. Leaders climb onto the escalation ladder willingly and in turn generate dynamics that they cannot easily unmake. The question now is how the United States and others can unwind these dynamics for a more stable, peaceful security environment. Missile defence plays a critical role, but technology won't save Israel from having to answer hard questions over its security strategy.

The recent escalation in this protracted feud occurred when Iran launched a barrage of drones and missiles towards Israel, exacerbating the already strained relationship between the two states. In response, the international community has issued fervent calls for de-escalation, urging both parties to exercise restraint and pursue diplomatic dialogue. However, what precipitated this crisis, and what are the implications at stake? Moreover, what measures can be taken to mitigate this perilous situation?

The conflict between Iran and Israel stems from a multifaceted interplay of historical, religious, and political dynamics. The establishment of the State of Israel in 1948 marked a pivotal moment that led to the displacement of a significant number of Palestinians.

Iran, predominantly Shia Muslim, has steadfastly supported the Palestinian cause, often placing it in opposition to Israel, which has faced allegations of human rights abuses against Palestinians. The Iranian Revolution of 1979 injected a new dimension into this conflict. The emergence of Iran's Islamic regime, characterized by its anti-Western rhetoric, posed a direct challenge to Israel. Since then, these two nations have remained locked in a contentious struggle.

The stakes are incredibly high in this conflict. A fullscale war between Iran and Israel could result in catastrophic outcomes, not only for the involved nations but for the entire world. The Middle East, known for its volatility, risks further destabilization, potentially dragging other nations into a broader regional conflict.

So, how can we ease this crisis? The solution lies in open dialogue and diplomatic efforts. Both nations must be willing to engage in sincere discussions, free from any preconditions. The international community can play a crucial role by providing a neutral platform where both sides can voice their concerns and work towards a peaceful resolution.

#### AND ITS ROLE AS A MIDDLE EASTERN WAR MONGER

#### Where did it all begin?

Iran has been a constant threat to the stability of the middle-east ever since the Iranian Revolution of '79 and the consequent rise of Ayatollah Khomeini. Khomeini's rule, forged in the aftermath of the deposition of the Shah of Iran, was

steeped in hostility towards the West and its allies. Reborn as a theocratic republic under Khomeini, Iran became an Islamic extremist nation under him. A part of this transformation lies in the fact that Khomeini believed that "colonial powers (think USA) had conspired to undermine Islam both with religious quietism and with secular ideologies, especially socialism, liberalism, monarchism, and nationalism."



Given the massive amount of proxy forces Iran commands, do they still retain control over them? Upon plotting the massive range of influence of Iran's proxy forces in the Middle East, it's not very hard to realise that almost everything and anything that

happens in the Middle East, is influenced by Iran in some way or form. Despite this seemingly massive authority, diplomatically, Iran stands alone. One may argue that Iran uses these groups as mere puppets: their sole purpose? To either regulate tensions in their areas of influence or to protect their master's interests; but this line of thought omits a crucial point regarding this question: the reason for the formation of these groups and the history surrounding them. Taking that into account, Iran may as well have heavily armed and funded massive non-governmental actors with a history of hyper-aggression, that poses a massive security threat to the entire Middle Eastern region.







If the entire world knows that Iran is a state sponsor of terrorism, why does nobody do anything about it? The US has not retaliated against a majority of Iran's provocations, and actions - emboldening them by their restraint. The Democrats have, in their (rightful) fear of

conflict, allowed the US to take the back-foot in US-Iran discussions. Indeed, the consequences have been disastrous, the prudent approach of restraint has failed miserably, after all, peace can only be imposed by the strong upon the weak. The failure of the West to provide effective deterrence has served to embolden a nation that could never have abided with the Western value system. Their antipathy has been shouted from rooftops throughout Iran and in their houses of Parliments, but the world has turned a deaf ear to them. Now that so many have died in Israel, perhaps the West shall rethink their attitudes, or else only disaster awaits.




#### How has Iran established itself as a "War Monger"?

The US government has labelled Iran as a State Sponsor of Terrorism in 1984 and rightly so. As a Shia majority, Iran's external operations cover a range of proxy terrorists through Shia militia groups that

have severely destabilised countries such as Syria, threatened governments and undertaken massive campaigns of terror. The regional instability of the Middle East allowed Iran to swiftly establish itself as a major contender in the global playing field. Their rise to power was further accelerated when the US government killed Saddam Hussein, greatly weakening Iraq - which was a major opponent to Iran at the time.








What led Iran to become a state sponsor of terrorism across the middle east? The Arabs only ever had some semblance of unity back when they stood against Israel together, but ever since acceptance of Israel increased, Iran has been increasingly isolated in the Middle East. As one

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of the few Shia majority nations in the Middle East, it has constantly faced intense opposition from Saudi Arabia and other middle eastern countries. With the absence of support from its neighbours and fear of the US's neo-colonialism, Iran chose to cultivate external forces of its own, a method which achieved success during the Iranian Revolution. What it could not achieve through diplomacy, it acquired through these regional proxies, which due to the international community's laxness turned into formidable forces capable of disrupting both the middle east and the world.

Third position -Subansiri-Namdang








# THEOUTPOST


